PEDIATRIC SECTION REPORT

The Pediatric Section had a very successful meeting at the recent annual meeting of the CSACI. There was discussion about confusion that continues to occur among patients, pharmacists and referring physicians about the proper dosing of epinephrine auto-injectors. It was agreed that there is a need for a brief consensus statement from our group clarifying the proper dosing of epinephrine auto-injectors.

There was discussion about recent changes made in recommendations regarding the early introduction of foods into an infant's diet. There was recognition and discussion of the work that has recently been done in the U.S. and Europe in this regard, culminating in the recent publication of the update of the AAP maternal and infant feeding guidelines. It was felt that there is also a need for a concise statement from our society. The statement would be useful as a position statement, but also as a potential resource for patients.

Other topics were also discussed at the meeting, including issues surrounding the prescription of epinephrine auto-injectors for children with isolated systemic cutaneous symptoms after a venomous insect sting. During the meeting, a short discussion or "needs assessment" was performed to determine potential topics for upcoming annual meetings of the CSACI.

ALLIED HEALTH - Annual Meeting in Hamilton October 2008—Report

CSACI Allied Health members enjoyed an educational weekend in Hamilton learning from various specialists in the field of Allergy and Immunology. Our general sense is that this conference was particularly applicable to the level of the Allied Health member with more focus not only on what is happening in research but how does the research translate for patients, families and expectant mothers. A general theme of this meeting was the impact that allergic disease has on patients and their families. There was both a sense of optimism for the future treatment of allergic disease and also a need for health care professionals to do more to educate, particularly patients in the area of compliance with regular medication use and the area of anaphylaxis. Here is a summary of the weekend highlights.

Rhinosinusitis

Dr. Baroody (University of Chicago)

Saline irrigations are thought to improve mucociliary transport which is impaired in sinusitis

Treatment:

- ♦ Anti-inflammatory Rx is most important / Role for antifungal Rx seems minimal; and
- ♦ Little evidence for other adjunctive Rx

Immunotherapy

Dr. Bowen gave a lively presentation on immunotherapy challenging members to "GO for the CURE!" Immunotherapy was discussed as currently the only therapy aimed at modifying the underlying disease process of asthma. Immunotherapy was a hot topic at this conference and the general sense is that we will be seeing more of it in the future. There was discussion on the use of Sublingual immunotherapy and the use of combo immunotherapy versus one allergen immunotherapy.

Anaphylaxis

Anaphylaxis Canada discussed Anaphylaxis in the Community setting which was followed up by a hands on demonstration of both EpiPen® and Twinject™. In a Canadian Study demonstrating use of an Auto Injector the pass rate was surprising low... Pass rate for Parents 37% - Health care professionals 25 % - Teacher 12%. A suggestion from the audience was to have families practice administering their expired Auto Injector into an orange in the presence of their Health Care Provider. Some of us felt this may decrease anxiety around administering an Auto Injector and others felt anxiety may be increased after seeing the needle.

Things that have been learned from anaphylaxis fatalities are:

- People who died often had previous allergic reactions
- ♦ Teens and young adults more at risk
- People also diagnosed with asthma are at greater risk
- There was a delay in getting epinephrine
- Accidentally ate a food thought to be safe

Anaphylaxis more commonly occurs at home. Out of 148 reactions to peanut 59 (40%) occurred at home where we think children should be the safest. There is room for improvement in increasing the safety of people with food allergies.

Food Allergies

Dr. Jonathan O'B Hourihane (Ireland) discussed practical issues families ask about.

- ♦ A Quality of Life survey was mentioned where people living with Type I Diabetes rated a higher quality of life than people living with food allergies.
- There was a theme discussed regarding what should we tell expectant mothers who want to prevent food allergy. Generally the consensus was leaving the mother alone to do what she would normally do because we don't have enough evidence to make recommendations.
- Some things that the mother can be told is that breastfeeding for the first 4-6 months is beneficial.

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ALLIED HEALTH - Annual Meeting in Hamilton October 2008 - Report (cont'd)

Atopic Dermatitis

Dr. Judy Wismer spoke about eczema therapies and an important question for patients about their eczema and asking patients, "How is your itch? Not how is your rash?"

Asthma

Dr. Mark Greenwald discussed how GINA guidelines of optimal control differ from our current guidelines for asthma control in his talk The Asthma Control Goal Post...Not a Moving Target!

- ♦ The current state of asthma control, patient perceptions about asthma and the practical application of asthma control were discussed.
- ICS are currently the best treatment for asthma but there is no evidence that we can modify the disease of asthma
 by use of ICS.

Dr. Lemanske (University of Wisconsin) spoke of different wheezing phenotypes in children i.e., transient, non-atopic and atopic asthmatics. He suggested that inflammation probably begins in early life and referred to research that suggests that although early use of inhaled corticosteroids decreases symptoms, they do not alter the course of asthma once they are discontinued.

Poster Discussion

This year, the poster viewing was followed up with a poster discussion symposium. This allowed a casual interactive approach that provided helpful feedback and an open forum discussion that seemed to be well received by those in attendance. Posters submitted included a small number from Allied Health professionals.

IMMUNOTHERAPY MANUAL

Prescribing and administering allergy injections are important activities performed by every practicing allergist. In spite of this, the teaching experience around allergy injections has been an identified educational gap in Canadian Allergy/Immunology training programs This year, a CSACI committee, co-chaired by Drs. Susan Waserman and Harold Kim, is in the process of designing a manual of immunotherapy, with a focus on the practical "how to" aspects of "allergy shots". Drs Bill Moote, David Fisher, Charles Frankish, Sean Mace, Mark Greenwald and Eric Leith are other members of this committee and will share their practice insights. The manual should be ready for the next academic year and will hopefully become a valuable resource for both trainees and teaching faculty.

ANAPHYLAXIS IN SCHOOLS & OTHER SETTINGS, SECOND EDITION

Plans are underway for the second edition of the consensus guidelines, *Anaphylaxis in Schools & Other Settings*, which will include input from twelve national healthcare organizations with an interest in anaphylaxis. The proposed changes submitted by the participating organizations will be reviewed by the principal authors in the first quarter of 2009.

Approved changes will be incorporated into the English and French versions of the guidelines document and the companion websites, www.allergysafecommunities.ca and www.securite-allergie.ca. The second edition of the consensus guidelines is currently planned for release in Fall 2009.
